

WHAT THEY SAY ABOUT THE HUNGARORING

LEWIS HAMILTON – Mercedes AMG Petronas F1 Team

The Hungarian Grand Prix is always a special one for me, with four pole positions and four wins from my eight races there so far – including my first victory for Mercedes in 2013. I don't really have any secrets for this circuit – I've just been very fortunate over the years and it's a track I really enjoy. It's one where you can really attack, which works for an attacking driver like myself, so perhaps it suits my driving style a little bit more than some others. I've always had great support there from the fans too, so I always look forward to going to Budapest.

The weather is usually fantastic in Hungary and the circuit itself is quite an old-school layout, so it's got plenty of great characteristics. It definitely suits my "aggressive" driving style – as I think a lot of people like to call it. You start the lap with DRS across the pit straight – which is actually quite short compared to a lot of other tracks. You're then late on the brakes into the right-hander of Turn One, ideally hitting the apex right in the middle, then hard on the power and opening the DRS once again on exit. You have to brake really deep into the left-handed Turn Two and really hug the apex, with a good line crucial to allow you to go flat-out through the right-hander at Turn Three – using all of the kerb on exit. It's really hard to see the apex at Turn Four, which arrives very quickly and is another really fast corner. Turn Five is then a bit slower – heading back to the right and with a bumpy surface on exit which can easily lead to oversteer moments.

A good run through the Turn Six /Seven chicane needs you to take all the available kerb through the first part and then get hard on the power out of the second – leading into a really nice left-right-left-right sequence at Turns Eight, Nine, 10 and 11. You have to be really patient through here, as a good rhythm is important.

Finally, you're into the last sector – beginning with Turn 12. There is a lot of grip on the way into this corner, which requires minimum kerb contact on entry but maximum on exit. You need patience once more through Turn 13, which you almost have to make into a "vee" for the best line, and again through the final corner, Turn 14, which is crucial for a good run down the straight.

Hungary is always a really fun weekend in a lot of different ways. Budapest is a really cool city, with a lot of nice things to do in the evening with all the restaurants on the river. I often have friends come to this race as they really enjoy the place – although, of course, while they're out partying on the Saturday night, I'll focusing and preparing for the race! We've had some great after-race parties on the Sunday night in Hungary before, as it's the last one before the summer break. So, you always go into the weekend hoping you can give everyone back at the factories something to really cheer about as a reward for all their hard work before they go on holiday!

The Hungaroring itself is quite a unique circuit as it is very small and narrow – almost like a street circuit, but in the form of a permanent race track. It's really twisty, with very few straights and the left-right-left-right nature meaning you barely get any time to relax. You're always in action, so it's very tough on the driver. Luckily, I enjoy those sorts of challenges as it's where you can really make a difference as a driver. You also have to really nail some of the kerbs to get the line just right, otherwise you'll lose the rhythm and lose a lot of speed.

Budapest as a venue is also quite tough on the driver physically, as it can get very hot. Again, the lack of straights also mean you have very little time to take a breather and get some cool air rushing around you. You're always tensed up in the cockpit, fighting all the corners, so it is pretty demanding from that perspective.

The key corners around the circuit are Turn One, which is the best place to overtake after the longest DRS straight on the track, and then I would say Turn Five. This is around the back of the circuit and comes after the very fast Turn Four - sweeping up and right for quite a long time. It's easy to get this one wrong and you really have to hook your inside tyre into the little ditch on the inside of the apex to make it work best, so it's tricky but a lot of fun.



SEBASTIAN VETTEL - Scuderia Ferrari

It's an entertaining track, there are a lot of elevation changes. My favorite part is in the second sector, between corner 8 and 11, because you don't really have time to rest. The last corner is one of the longest of Formula 1, it seems to be almost never ending...

KIMI RÄIKKONEN - Scuderia Ferrari

I quite like the Hungaroring, even if the track is slower than many others, in the past years we saw many exciting race there. Normally it's very hot there, but not that hard for the driver, as it may be for engines and tyres. I've always seen a lot of Finnish fans around the track: I think it's one of the most easily accessible races from Finland.

DANIEL RICCIARDO – Infiniti Red Bull Racing

I really like the circuit. In terms of qualifying it's one of the coolest on the calendar. The second sector is corner after corner. I like circuits like that with a lot of rhythm and not too many straights. It's bumpy and it's flowing, so yeah I enjoy it a lot.

I also think about summer as the race is before the summer break and I always feel that there is a cool, summery atmosphere there.

My most memorable moment there was the win last year. It was my second win, but I was able to celebrate as if it was my first one. The first win I couldn't really celebrate, because there was a big crash and I wasn't sure, if the drivers were quite okay. In Hungary I was then able to let out a lot more emotions.

I've been to very cool restaurants and clubs in Budapest. I like to take my mechanics out to a medieval restaurant. You eat with your hands and it's just big meat platters and very old school.

DANIIL KVYAT – Infiniti Red Bull Racing

My opinion of the Hungaroring is very good, I think it is a very nice track in an amazing city with great fans! So the first thing comes to my mind for sure: it is a great city and so much fun. I always have a good time in Budapest. I really like the area along the Danube river, it's very beautiful especially in the evenings. I won the race there in 2012 in Formula Renault, and wins will always be stuck in my memo-ry...



MAX VERSTAPPEN - Scuderia Toro Rosso

I've raced at the Hungaroring in Formula 3 last year and from what I could remember about it, I think it should suit our car as there aren't too many long straights, so I'm optimistic we can have a good result. In Formula 3, I didn't have a great weekend, my best result being a fourth place in the third and final race. I expect this could be one of our best races this year for us. I have seen the city a bit, as I also attended an F3 test here; it's one of the nicest we visit and the people seem very keen on racing. After this race, we have our summer break, but I'm not really looking forward to it: I'd prefer to have another three races in the three weeks off!

CARLOS SAINZ - Scuderia Toro Rosso

It's a track that every driver I think knows pretty well and it's one of the historic European tracks that everyone loves going to. I have finished on the podium there a couple of times and it's a track I enjoy driving. The weather can play a part here, either with a heavy summer storm or because the air and track temperatures can often be the highest of the season. That means it can be a challenging weekend physically and also in terms of tyre and car performance. There's very little time to relax on a lap, because there are no real straights, as even the pit straight is very short. I've spent a bit of time in the centre of Budapest, not for very long, but it is a really beautiful city, especially the parts close to the river Danube. It's truly special.

NICO HÜLKENBERG – Sahara Force India F1 Team

I've always had good memories of racing in Hungary. My first visit was in 2009 racing in the GP2 Series and I won the Saturday race. It's quite a tight and twisty track, where there is little room for mistakes. It's also a very technical lap, especially the second sector where there are several combinations of corners that all flow into each other. It's tricky because if you go off the racing line you lose your momentum and the whole sector is ruined. So it's a track where accuracy is very important. We've had a good run of races recently, and I've scored well in the last three races, so I want to keep up that momentum in Budapest. I always look forward to going back to the city, which is just a nice place to visit."

SERGIO PÉREZ – Sahara Force India F1 Team

The Hungarian Grand Prix is always a cool event. The fans are very enthusiastic and they show lots of support to all the drivers. It's definitely an enjoyable weekend. The track itself is very technical: you need good traction to get grip out of the low-speed corners. Because it's so twisty, it feels like you are always in a corner. It's also quite demanding on the tyres, so it's important to look after them when you can. It's the last race before the summer holidays so getting a strong result in Hungary is always a nice boost. I'm feeling optimistic that we can go there and race for some good points.



FELIPE NASR – Sauber F1 Team

Budapest and the grand prix are still quite hot – in every aspect. And I have good memories of it. The Hungaroring is a real challenge for both drivers and engineers, as it is one of the most technical circuits on the calendar. The layout of the track results in a high percentage of time spent cornering. This means the required level of downforce is similar to Monaco. There are a lot of longer corners that all flow from each other, with most of them being low to medium speed. The qualifying position is particularly important, as overtaking is still difficult.

MARCUS ERICSSON - Sauber F1 Team

The Hungaroring is one of those unique circuits in terms of the track layout. I like Budapest and racing on that circuit. The track has several medium speed corners and stability is particularly important there. It's also very demanding on the tyres, especially in the long corners, and also because temperatures can be quite high, which you have to take into account, especially for the tyre management. The track is very technical and it will be difficult to overtake. My favourite parts are turns one to five, and especially turn four, a fast lefthander, which is blind when you turn into it, so taking the kerb there is very exciting.

HUNGARORING

Classical. This is what it has become over the past years, the race track of Hungaroring. It was built almost three decades ago as a rarity of its time, for being the first one beyond the Iron Curtain, and now it is still special as the third behind Monte-Carlo and Monza to have continuously featured in the F1 race calendar.

Hungaroring is preparing for a great event, the 30th Hungarian Grand Prix this year, and for this occasion perhaps a little nostalgia is allowed, recalling the victory of Nelson Piquet at the first race held here – in front of more than two hundred-thousand (!) spectators. We also remember how Nigel Mansell (who always celebrated his birthday at us and once got a horse called Skala as a present) lost a wheel nut and with it the race itself, even though he had started from pole position in 1987. Damon Hill's bad luck is also memorable, when in the final lap, due to a technical problem victory slipped his hands (1997), just as the great battles fought on the asphalt between Alain Prost and Ayrton Senna. Jenson Button's rainy victory (his first) is just as much the part of the race track's history as Michael Schumaher or Lewis Hamilton's four Hungarian victories respectively.

Now it is history but at that time it was a fantastic achievement (and quite unparalleled in the world) that Hungaroring was built within a mere eight months, so that on the 10 August 1986 the First Hungarian Grand Prix could take place. The total length of the circuit was 4014.76 meters. The race track has been reconstructed twice since then, first in 1989 removing chicane nr.3 from the trackline (the length of the track was 3972 km), than in 2003. This latter brought a more significant change: longer finish straight, modified 1st and 14th corners and a total track length now is 4381, 44 m. Hungaroring has by now developed to serve as a centre of motorsports, all those interested in the sports can find adequate possibilities and one can choose from the following options: Test Course for Driving Technique, Hungaroring Off Road Park, Hungaroring Gokart Centre, Hungaroring School for Racing Training, Hungaroring Minimotor School.

The race is hot – this is the most often heard remark from those speaking about the Hungarian run. Then immediately added: one of the most challenging races of the season from the pilots' point of view. To win on this tricky, tortuous track that hardly offers any straights is an enormous achievement, one that has never been accomplished by for example Sebastian Vettel, though being one of the most talented drivers of our time, and not even in that season that was totally dominated by his victories. Among the many modern race tracks built in a uniform style, Hungaroring represents an older tradition, the classical style that has gained extra value for now. It is really popular with the drivers and the teams. "The valley, the environment is beautiful and the proximity of the capital is a great attraction really to everyone – said Zsolt Gyulay, president CEO of Hungaroring who is a two-time Olympic champion and member of the Olympic Committee, still amazed by the professionalism demonstrated by the teams. As he says, the reason why it is excellent to work with the field and staff members of Formula 1 is that they are quick to take up the pace.



"Everybody is highly disciplined here, as basically the whole of motorsport is. Also it demands professionalism to know that we play a part in one of the most, or perhaps the most viewed race series of the world, which means obligations for the pilots and the hosting countries alike" Gyulay adds. Back to the Hungarian Grand Prix once more. It must not go unmentioned that our race has never been in danger in the past decades, what is more, once (in 2002) it won the prize of Run of the Year, that was received at the season closing gala of the international association.

An organic part of the race track's history that on Hungaroring, as the first Hungarian, Csaba Kesjár (who unfortunately later died in a tragic racing accident) drove a Formula 1 car in 1987, testing Zakspeed, and also here was the first run of Formula 1 of Zsolt Baumgartner's career (2003 – Jordan), who got the great opportunity after the accident and injury of Ralph Firmann, and than he had a contract for a full season with Minardi in the following year.

At the moment there is no Hungarian driver in the Formula-1 world championship series, yet in the racing calendar the Hungarian Grand Prix with its decades long history still plays a significant role, and will continue to do so based on our contract until 2021.












PRESS ROOM 2nd FLOOR (HUNGARORING)






PRESS ROOM 3nd FLOOR








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HUNGARORING RED ZONES



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
