FIA President Jean Todt began his motorsport career as a rally co-driver in 1966, competing for a wide range of manufacturers before winning the 1981 Constructors' World Rally Championship with Guy Frequelin for Talbot Lotus. He then began a successful decade with Peugeot as its Sporting Director, and later Motorsport Director, during which time the marque won two Constructors' and Drivers' World Rally Championships, secured four consecutive Paris-Dakar victories and won two Le Mans 24 Hour wins as well as the 1992 World Sports Car Championships.

Todt left Peugeot in 1993 and became Team Principal of Scuderia Ferrari, overseeing 14 Formula 1 World titles and 106 grands prix victories. He went on to become Chief Executive Officer of the Gestione Sportiva, before leaving Ferrari in 2009 when he was elected to his current position of President of the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile. In addition, Todt is President of eSafety Aware and a Member of the Board of Trustees of FIA Foundation for the Automobile and Society. He is an Honorary Member of the Automobile Club de France and Honorary President of Federazione Auto Motoristica Sammarinese (FAMS) of San Marino. In 2011, Todt was elevated to the dignity of Grand' Croix of the Légion d'Honneur of the French Republic and has been awarded similar distinctions in several other countries, including Italy, Ukraine, San Marino and Senegal.
