F1 Test Driver

Susie Wolff is a development driver for the Williams F1 Team since 2012 and a FIA Women in Motorsport ambassador. She made her Formula 1 debut putting the FW33 through its paces at a Williams partner event at Silverstone in October 2012 and was given an increased programme in the team's simulator in 2013.

Susie will continue in her role in 2014 and she will become the first female driver to compete in a Formula 1 Grand Prix Session in over two decades, as she achieves her super license and takes to the wheel in the William FW36 in two FP1 sessions this summer.

Susie started her career at the early age of 8 she raced karts at club level, only a little later she successfully participated in karting championship in Scotland and England. Aged 14, she already snagged the top positions at both European and International levels. Her debut in single-seater racing is dated back to 2001 when she started off with Formula Renault.

In 2003, she got selected as the BRDC Rising Star and in addition she qualified as the only woman for the final round of the coveted McLaren Autosport BRDC Young Driver Award in 2003 and 2004. The following year she made the leap into the British F3 International Series.

Susie debuted in DTM and finished her first race within the top ten in 2006. During seven years, she had been an established racing driver. In 2010, she finished seventh and made points as first woman in DTM after almost 20 years. After 73 races with Mercedes-Benz, Susie was driving her last laps in the DTM at the seasons' finale in Hockenheim in October 2012.

Susie continues a work as a representative of the Wings of Life Foundation that has set an ultimate goal to make spinal cord injury curable.
