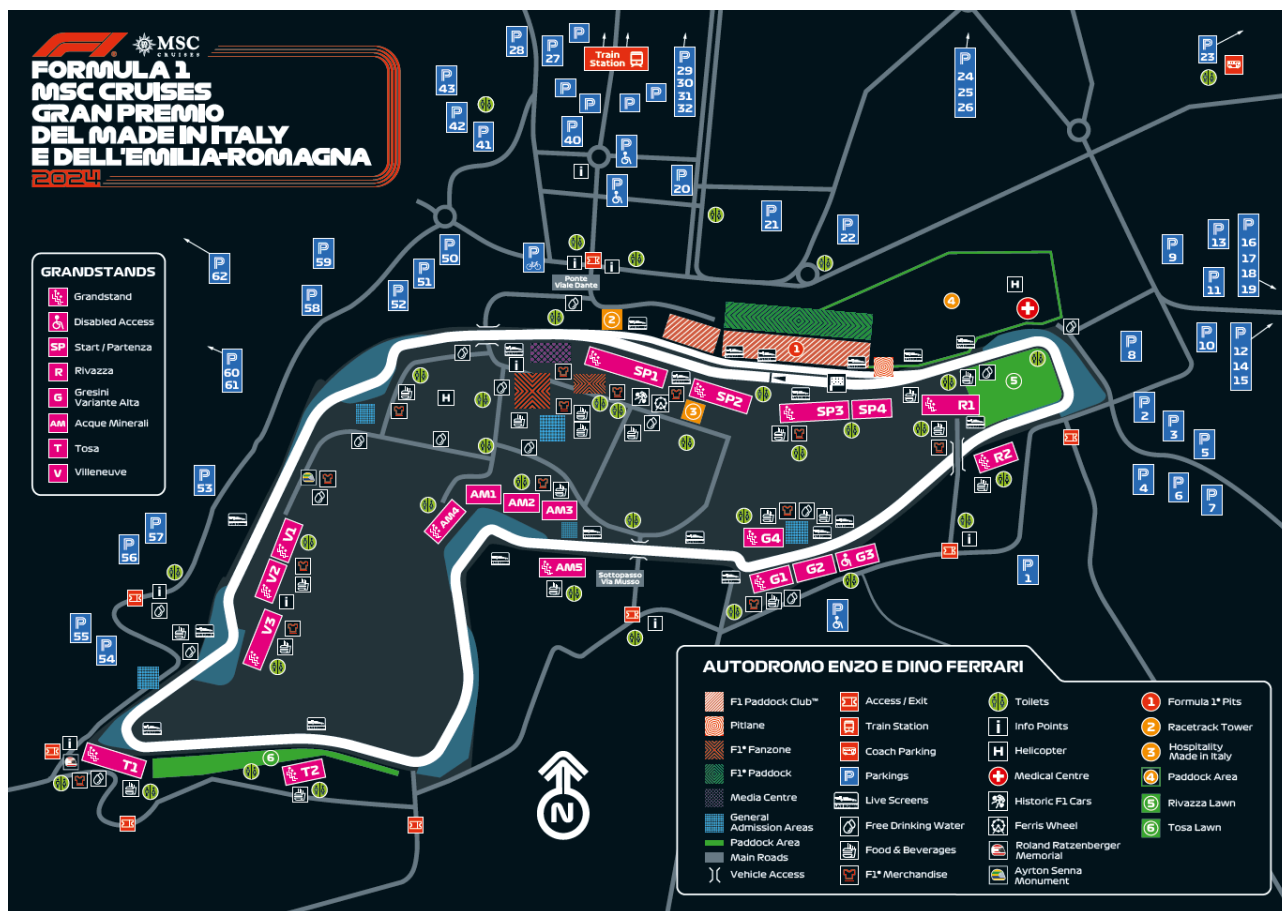

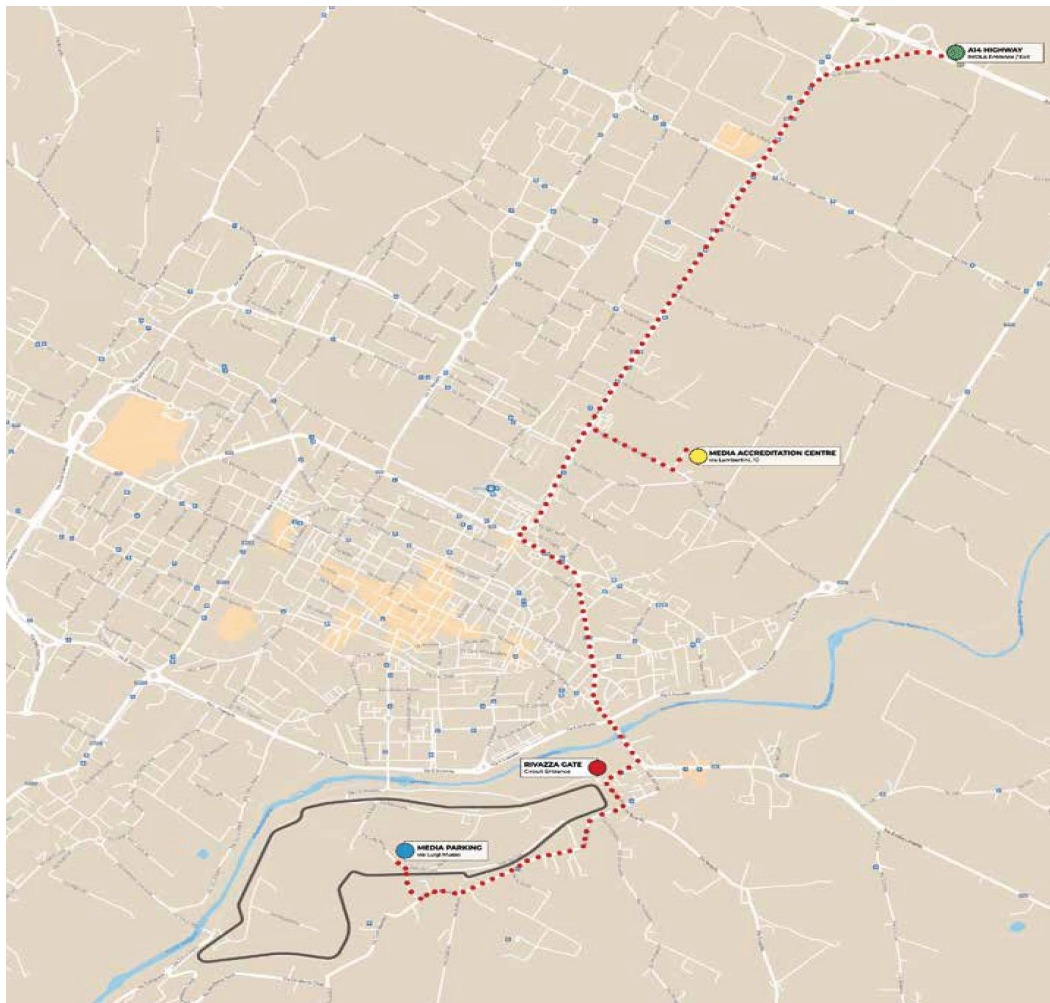


## IMOLA CIRCUIT MAP





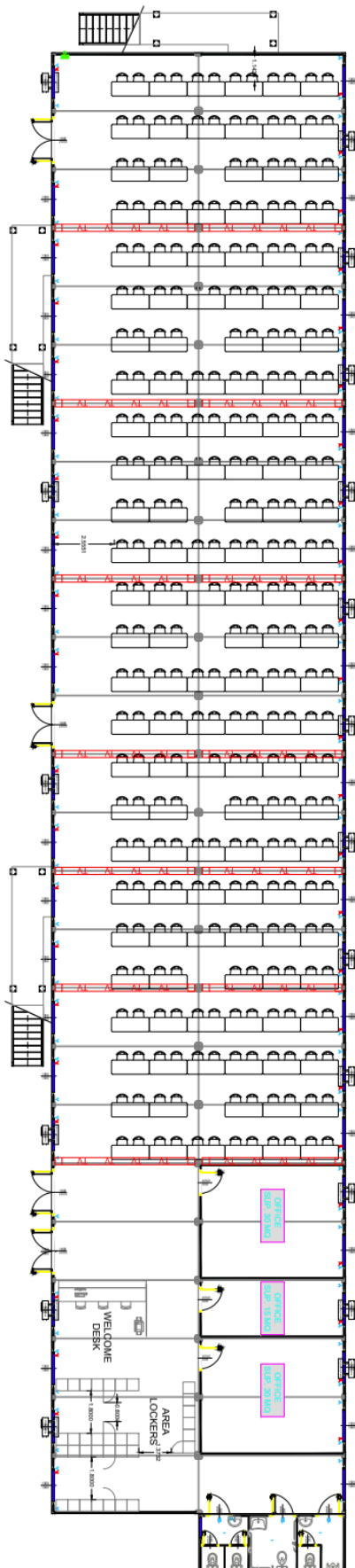
## MAC TO MEDIA PARKING MAP

### **Race - Shuttles:**

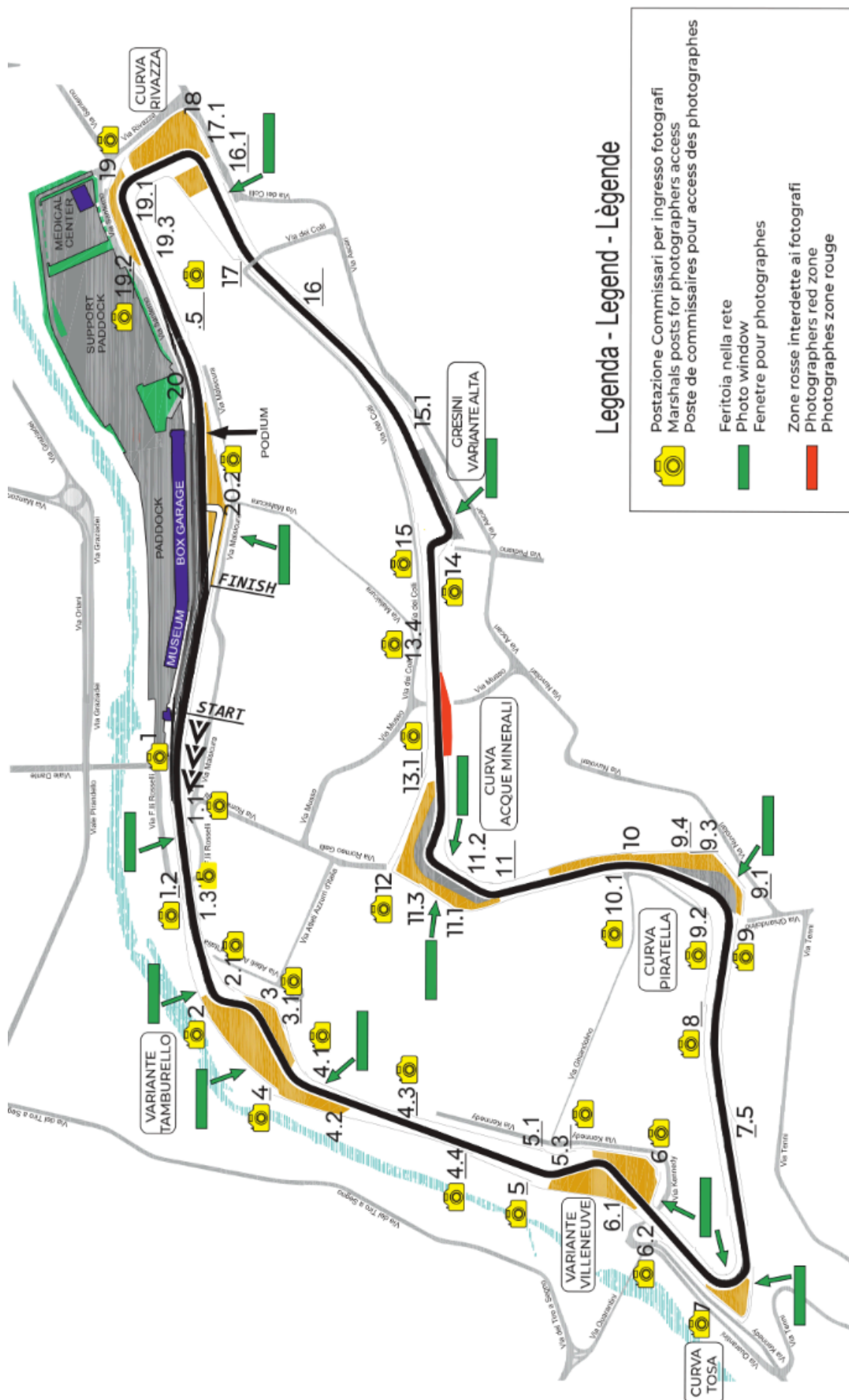
First departure 90 minutes before the starting time of the race.

## AUTODROMO ENZO E DINO FERRARI - IMOLA HISTORY

Passion for speed is part of Imola genetic heritage since ancient times. During the Roman Age, in 80 B.C., when its name was Forum Cornelli, Imola already had an Amphitheatre where chariots ran... waiting for the iron horses! The layout of the present racetrack was carried out at the end of the 1940's. A series of public works was launched to raise the depressed post-war economy. The most significant one was the construction of a new road that connected via Emilia – today Rivazza curve – to the hamlet of Codrignano, up to the Tosa curve. So, it was that four motor racing passionate citizens (Alfredo Campagnoli, Graziano Golinelli, Ugo Montevecchi and Gualtiero Vighi) thought to build a racetrack among those hills. The passion of the four men was soon joined by Checco Costa, who would become the coordinator of great motorcyclist events.

**1950.** On March 22nd the foundation stone of the Imola circuit is laid, although red tape and problems of expropriation of adjoining estates slow down construction.

**1952.** On October 19th the track undergoes its first real test: Enzo Ferrari provides a 340 Sport car which is alternately driven by Ascari, Marzotto and Villoresi who record an average speed of 149 kmh. Two wheelers are also tested: Masetti (on Gilera) with Lorenzetti and Montanari, both on Moto Guzzi, record average speeds of 138 km/h.

**1953.** On April 25th the Coni motorcycle Grand Prix, valid for the Italian Championship of 125 and 500 cc classes, officially inaugurates the Imola Circuit.

**1954.** On June 20th the circuit sees the start of the era of world-class motor racing with the organization of the "Conchiglia d'Oro Shell" race, reserved to Sport cars. A fierce fight takes place between the Ferrari and Maserati drivers. The challenge is won by Maglioli (Ferrari) followed by Musitelli and Musso (both driving Maseratis). Two future protagonists of the history of world motor racing also ranked: the Englishman Colin Chapman and the Australian Jack Brabham. On April 25th of the same year, the Imola circuit also hosts the motorcycle racing version of the Conchiglia d'Oro Shell race, which becomes known in grand prix history thanks to the rich prize: 12 million liras (about 4.5 thousand English pounds)!

**1956.** Another big name in the world motor racing, Bernie Ecclestone, rides at Imola in 1956, in a motorcycle race on a Norton Max.

**1963.** On April 21st, the Formula 1 Circus makes its entrance at Imola but the race is not valid for the F1 World Championship. On the very day that greets the victory of Jim Clark with the mythical Lotus 25, the absence of the Ferrari team is even more striking, all the more so that the Ferrari constructors had promised to enter John Surtees.

**1965.** The track now has a grandstand built alongside the straight stretch, making the circuit look like a real motordrome.

**1969.** On September 7th, with the "Nazioni Grand Prix", the Imola circuit hosts the World Motorcycle Racing Championship for the first time. As fate would have it, once again as in the 1963 F1 Grand Prix, the most glorious Italian constructor Mv Agusta does not participate in a world event.

**1970.** In order to seal the friendship between Enzo Ferrari and the Imola Circuit, the motordrome is named after his son Dino died, in 1956, at the age of 24.

**1972.** On April 23rd another successful idea comes to the mind of the circuit managers: Checco Costa launches the "European Daytona", the European equivalent of the famous American 200 Mile-race.

**1979.** Construction work on the Imola track continues and as soon as the ring roads around the circuit are completed, it becomes permanent. Up to then some streets had been public highways. On September 19th of the same year, the new era of the F1 starts at Imola with a race valid for the World Championship.

**1980.** On September 14th Imola hosts its first F.1 race valid for the world championship: it's the 51st Italian Grand Prix, moved from Monza to Imola.

**1981.** May 3rd is the birthday of the San Marino Grand Prix.

**1986.** On June 8th the Imola circuit hosts a F3000 International Championship round for the first time.

**1988.** After the death of 'Drake' Enzo Ferrari on August 14th, his name is added to his son Dino's name as the official track denomination.

**1994.** On April 30th during the qualifying practice and on May 1st just after the start of the San Marino GP, two accidents occur that take the lives of Roland Ratzenberger and Ayrton Senna.

**1995.** In order to reduce the speed of the track, the Tamburello and Villeneuve bends are redesigned into two chicanes.

**1996.** Starting this year, and for the following three, the World Motorcycle Racing Championship, missing from Imola since 1988, returns to Imola with the Città di Imola G.P. organized on September 1st.

**2001.** Motorbikes are back in Imola, for the most spectacular and exciting event: the last round of the FIM World Superbike Championship.

**2004.** For the first time, the circuit hosts the FIA European Touring Car Championship (ETCC) and the FIA GT World Championship.

**2005.** The two before-mentioned events are repeated in 2005, each now valid on a world-championship level. The San Marino F1 GP is at its 25th edition.

**2006.** Once the sporting activity comes to an end, on November 19th 2006 at 4:14 p.m., the old pit building is demolished using 700 sticks of dynamite. Witnessing the explosion are 3,000 people crowded in touching silence on the hill of the Rivazza Bend.

**2007.** September sees the completion of the upgrading and revamping works, done by world-famous German architect Hermann Tilke, which involved the circuit and its facilities, in particular the garages, the paddock and the Race Control Room.

**2008.** On March 6th, the signatures are placed on the convention for the new thirty-year management of the circuit, which the Municipality entrusts to Formula Imola S.p.A. The circuit gates officially open again on May 3rd. As far as sports events go, the track is inaugurated with a race of the World Touring Car Championship (WTCC). However, during the summer, other work is done to the circuit which, among other things, includes the layout of the entrance to the pit-lane and the widening of the run-off area of the "Piratella" Bend.

**2009.** The New Variante Bassa is built, needed to meet the standardization requirements of the International Motorcycle Federation (FIM). The works, completed on July 7th, were experimented before everyone else by the Superbike champions during the official tests in July, in view of the long-awaited return to the river Santerno track of 12th round of the Superbike World Championship.

**2010.** The sports activities grow steadily both for cars and bikes. During the season many high-level events took place such as Ferrari Challenge, Superstars, Aci-Csai Italian Championships, and the 12th Round of the FIM Superbike World Championship. In the last weekend of September, the SBK World Championship is won for the first time by an Italian rider, Max Biaggi, riding an Italian bike, Aprilia.

**2011.** A very prestigious calendar this year with GP2 Asia Series and 6 Ore di Imola as car races and the 11th Round of the SBK World Championship for bikes. In August the track underwent asphaltting also in view of this SBK Round that will take place at the end of September.

**2013.** The World SBK Championship is confirmed as the main event at the Enzo and Dino Ferrari Racetrack. The car-racing season sees the comeback of European Le Mans Series, Aci-Csai Italian Championship, International Superstars Series and Imola Classic.



**2014.** In the year that celebrates the 20th anniversary of the death of Ayrton Senna and Roland Ratzenberger, to which are dedicated four days of celebration from 1st to 4th May. For what concerns car racings, not to be missed is the "4 Hours of Imola" European Le Mans Series, scheduled on 17th and 18th May.

**2015.** An events calendar that ranges from motorbikes, through concerts, to exhibitions is what characterizes the 2015 season. As always, Superbike World Championship is the main event, scheduled from May 8th to May 10th. The week after, European Les Mans Series- 4 Hours of Imola will take place, followed on May 20th by the arrival of one of the stages of Giro d'Italia. The big entertainment will be celebrated by the legendary AC/DC, whose concert on July 9th will be the only date in Italy for the band.

**2018.** 16th FIM Superbike World Championship, which also this year opens the international season of two-wheeled races on track in Italy. Great news of the season the dispute of the last round of the MXGP World of cross, while there is the return of the arrival of a stage of the Giro d'Italia cycling Professionals. Great space for "historic" events with the first edition of the Motor Legend Festival and the third of the Minardi day.

**2019.** The Motul FIM Superbike World Championship - Pirelli Italian Round is again this year the main sporting event of Imola Circuit calendar. Following the great success of 2018, the Moto Cross World Championship MXGP is back again. Imola remains the scene of "historic" events, with the fourth edition of Minardi Day and the return of the 200 Miglia Revival. Among the four-wheels sporting events, the spotlight is on the Ferrari Challenge and the Italian Aci Racing Weekend Championships.

**2020.** In a season strongly conditioned by the Covid-19 pandemic, the Enzo and Dino Ferrari International Circuit was equally able to be at the center of the international sports scene with two huge events: The Road Cycling World Championship and, especially, the Formula 1. With the Emilia Romagna Grand Prix, which brought the World Championship to Imola after 14 years, Formula 1 is back in Imola with applause from the FIA, F1, drivers, teams for the organization.

**2021.** This season, the Enzo and Dino Ferrari Circuit hosted once again the most important event of the season: the "F1 Pirelli Gran Premio del Made in Italy e dell'Emilia Romagna". Unfortunately, due to the Covid situation, events took place with no public. The circuit has also been the setting of the fifth edition of the Minardi Day.

**2022.** Last year the Enzo e Dino Ferrari Circuit has reached an agreement to host permanently "Formula 1 Rolex Gran Premio del Made in Italy e dell'Emilia Romagna". The season will be full of four-wheel events among which GT World Challenge, Les Mans Series, DTM, Ferrari Challenge World Final Championship and Minardi Day. There will be also concerts with international artists such as Pearl Jam and Vasco Rossi.

**2023.** Unfortunately, following the flood that hit the Emilia-Romagna region, motorsport events resumed in July and the most important event of the season was World SBK.

**2024.** This season, the Enzo and Dino Ferrari Circuit hosted once again a very important event: FIA World Endurance Championship – 6 hours of Imola.

The circuit will host once again the most important event of the season: the Formula 1 MSC Cruises Gran Premio del Made in Italy e dell'Emilia Romagna 2024.

The season will be full of four-wheel events among which European Les Mans Series, Ferrari Challenge World Final Championship and Minardi Day.

## **TOURISM IN IMOLA & TRAVEL INFORMATION**

What makes Emilia Romagna such an extraordinary place to visit is its capacity to capture the many different personalities of Italian people, well-known for their passion, warmth and love for good food. The Land of Motors has sprung up around and along Via Emilia, thereby creating a natural Motor Valley, where the Italian automotive legend was born.

Located in the province of Bologna, the capital of the region, Imola is a lively city where passion for motors and old historical traditions come to life. With its International Racetrack just a couple of minutes from the city center, the impressive Sforza Fortress and wide green areas, such as the Acque Minerali Park, it's a must see. While in town for Formula 1 Gran Prix, make sure not to miss the beauty of Palazzo Tozzoni.

If you love exploring and discovering, just drive along the Via Emilia towards Bologna: the nearby borgo of Dozza deserves a visit: this medieval town, surrounded by the greenest rolling hills, is famous for its Painted Walls and the Regional Wine Cellars located in the underneath of the Fortress. Get the chance to taste and take home the many varieties of wines produced in Emilia Romagna.

Another little treasure chest is the town of Brisighella: tucked away in this medieval town in Ravenna province is one of the most peculiar streets you will ever see. It is called Via del Borgo or Via degli Asini, it runs above the ground level and it is fully covered and included in the architecture of the buildings. Get a panoramic view from the Clock Tower or taste the locally produced olive oils at Agricultural Cooperative in Brisighella (C.A.B).

Hometown of the Alpha Tauri racing team, former Minardi Team, Faenza is the perfect destination for a laid-back walk around the streets of the town centre, where the many ceramic artisan shops will catch your eye with the incredible craftsmanship of the oldest tradition. Visit the MIC

– the International Museum of Ceramics to learn more about the history bonding this territory to the art of molding clay.

### **Electricity**

In Italy the electrical current is 220 volts AC (50 Hz). Electrical sockets comply with European regulations. In most hotels you will find adaptors for different types of plugs.

### **Currency**

Since 2001, the currency used in Italy is the Euro. One Euro is divided up into 100 Euro-cents. There are six different coins (5, 10, 20 and 50 Euro-cents, 1 and 2 Euros) and seven notes (5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 Euros).

### **ATMs**

ATMs (known as 'Bancomat' in Italy) are widely available throughout Italy, and most will accept cards tied into the Visa, MasterCard, Cirrus and Maestro systems.

Beware of transaction fees. Every time you withdraw cash, you'll be hit by charges – typically your home bank will charge a foreign-exchange fee (usually around 1%) as well as a transaction fee of around 1% to 3%. Fees can sometimes be reduced by withdrawing cash from banks affiliated with your home banking institution; check with your bank.

If an ATM rejects your card, try another one before assuming the problem is with your card.

### **Credit Cards**

Major cards such as Visa, MasterCard, Eurocard, Cirrus and Eurocheques are widely accepted. Amex is also recognised, although it's less common than Visa or MasterCard.

Virtually all midrange and top-end hotels accept credit cards, as do most restaurants and large shops. Some cheaper pensioni, trattorias and pizzerias only accept cash.

### **Pharmacies**

Pharmacists (farmacisti) can give you valuable advice and sell over-the-counter medication for minor illnesses. They can also advise you when more-specialised help is required and point you in the right direction. In major cities you are likely to find English-speaking doctors or a translator service available.

Pharmacies generally keep the same hours as other shops (8.30 – 12.30 / 15.00 – 19.30), closing at night and on Sundays. A handful, however, remain open on a rotation basis (farmacie

di turno) for emergency purposes. These are usually listed in newspapers or online. Closed pharmacies display a list of the nearest open ones.

### **Driving in Italy**

Documents required to drive in Italy:

Driving licences issued by any of the EU member states are valid throughout the European Union, including Italy.

Drivers in possession of a licence issued by any EU country do not require an international driving permit or a sworn translation of their own licence.

### **General rules for driving**

Driving licences issued by any of the EU Member States are valid throughout the European Union, including Italy.

Drivers with a licence issued by any EU country do not require an international driving permit or a legal translation of their own licence.

To drive in Italy, you must be over 18. Keep right and overtake on the left. Dipped headlights must be used on two-lane motorways. When driving through towns and villages, the horn may be sounded only in the event of an emergency. Trams and trains have right of way.

The use of seatbelts in both the front and rear seats is compulsory, and failure to keep them fastened may result in fines for both drivers and passengers. On three-lane motorways, the lane on the right is reserved for slow vehicles and vehicles that are not overtaking. At crossings, vehicles approaching from the right always have right of way.

Mopeds below 150cc may not be driven on motorways under any circumstances. Helmets are compulsory to drive all motorcycles and mopeds, whatever the engine size.

### **Speed Limits**

Cars and motorbikes (vehicles with engine size over 150 cc): urban areas 50 km/h (31 mph); minor out-of-town roads 90 km/h (56 mph); major out-of-town roads 110 km/h (68 mph); motorways 130 km/h (81 mph).

In the event of rain on snow, the limit is lowered to 110 k/h on motorways and 90 k/h on trunk roads.
