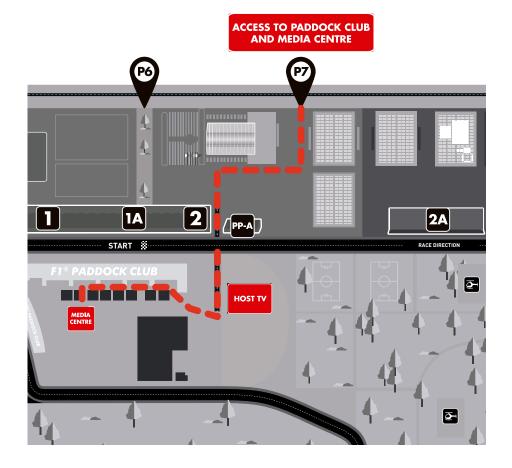

MEDIA CENTRE LOCATION





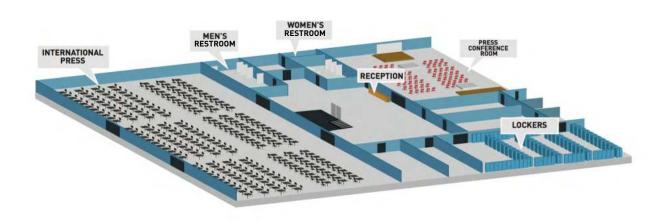

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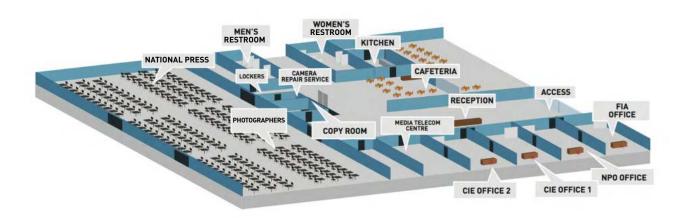

1 WORKING IN THE MEDIA CENTRE

The Media Centre is located in the Formula 1® Paddock (driver's right). All accredited journalists and photographers must register at Media Centre Reception on the lower level of the building on first arriving at the circuit. Staff at Reception will assist with seating allocation, internet access and locker keys if required.

2 STANDARD TELEPHONE, AND IT SERVICES

Standard phone services will be available to all media without a connection fee. Phones will be available in the Media Telecom Centre located in the lower level of the Media Centre. Also in this room there will be computers with internet and printing access.

3 FREE WIRELESS INTERNET SERVICES

Free wireless internet will be available in the Media Centre and Photographers' Centre. This network will allow 50 Mbps services for national and international press. Ethernet will be allowed in the Photographers' area. This will include Internet browsing, mail services and FTP services. A technician is available everyday (during opening hours). Inquire at the Reception Desk.

PHOTOGRAPHIC SERVICE Nikon and Canon technicians will be available on the lower level.

5 LOCKERS

Lockers are available on the upper and lower levels for photographers and press with a refundable deposit of \$10 USD / \$100 mexican pesos.

6 ELECTRICAL POWER

Each workstation is equipped with a power outlet: Voltage in Mexico is 114-140 volts. Members of the international press must inquire about compatibility of their electronic and electric devices. To obtain a transformer, please inquire at the Reception desk.

- No racing points for Checo

Two in-car radio messages, one from a driver, one from an excited onlooker, told the story of the FORMULA 1 GRAN PREMIO DE MEXICO 2018™, won for Red Bull by Max Verstappen for the second year in a row.

'Ha-ha, what a great Sunday!' said the young Dutchman, making an obvious comparison with the day before, when he narrowly missed out on what would have been his first Formula 1® pole position.

Pipped by teammate Daniel Ricciardo, Verstappen

turned Saturday disappointment into Sunday delight by cruising home for his second victory of 2018 and the fifth of his burgeoning F1® career.

The start was the key,' Verstappen said. 'We had the right tyres and the car was working brilliantly.' He duly made a quick get-away and turned Mad Max into Glad Max by romping home 17 seconds ahead of Sebastian Vettel's Ferrari, which inherited second place after Ricciardo added another retirement to his season-long list.

Kimi Räikkönen brought the second Ferrari home in third place, but it was the man in fourth who mattered most: Lewis Hamilton drove within his limits to secure the points required for his fifth Drivers'





World Championship, putting him in the company of two legends of the sport, Juan Manuel Fangio and Michael Schumacher

'That's how you do it!' yelled Will Smith, the American actor who in 2018 became a regular pit-lane buddy of Hamilton's.

'That's how you supposed to drive!' added a delighted Smith as Hamilton slowed his Mercedes in the circuit's atmospheric stadium section to receive the plaudits of another huge Mexican crowd at the Autódromo Hermanos Rodríguez.

When he could get a word in, Hamilton was quick to acknowledge them: 'A big thank you to all the Mexican fans who make this race so special,' said Hamilton first of all. 'It was a horrible race! I had a great start and was making my way up, then I really don't know what happened after that.'

Earlier those same fans had groaned when Sergio Pérez suddenly slipped back through the field then brought his Racing Point Force India into the pits to retire with brake problems on lap 39 – the first time the popular Checo failed to finish his home race.

Vettel and Ricciardo laid on some of the best battles of the race as they fought their way through traffic at the halfway stage. But like the weather in Mexico City, sunshine turned to cloud for Ricciardo on lap 61: after the joy of his brilliant pole position the Australian suffered his eighth non-finish of 2018, pulling off at Turn One to allow Vettel through.

With 21-year-old Charles Leclerc seventh for Alfa Romeo Sauber and 22-year-old Pierre Gasly 10th in his Toro Rosso Honda the fourth race of Mexico's new era emphasised the changing of the guard in Formula 1®

Fifteen cars finished the race, while one of the five non-finishers was a man who would retire from F1® at year's end, McLaren's Fernando Alonso – an innocent bystander in a first-lap clash between Nico Hülkenberg's Renault and the Force India of Esteban Ocon.



F1°'S FRIENDLY FIRE TEAM SZIRIT IN THE AGE OF SELFIES

It's an old, old F1® story.

Friendly fire: a battlefield catastrophe when one side accidentally inflicts damage on its own forces – or team-mates clash ontrack. Maybe friendly fire is also Formula 1®'s biggest paradox: is this a team sport or a showcase for individual brilliance? In the age of selfies, is there a place for team spirit?

Think Fangio commandeering a team-mate's car in the Fifties... Think Jones and Reutemann at Williams in the late Seventies... or Mansell and Piquet at the same team a decade later. Think, most obviously, of McLaren and their history with Prost and Senna when those two great champions were together – or simultaneously there? – in the red-and-white cars.

"The dream team," Ron Dennis called it when he announced that 1988 line-up. But within two seasons that too turned into a nightmare and Prost packed his bags and left for Ferrari. Which brings us neatly to 2019...

Maybe it's worse when there is a discrepancy in two teammates' age. As the Irish writer once said, "It's all that the young can do for the old, to shock them and keep them up to date." Maybe F1® and its team-mates are the best illustration of that simple fact of life...

The age difference is partly to blame for the recent unrest at Ferrari, F1®'s highest-profile team. Sebastian Vettel, a

Ferrari driver since 2015, is 32; Charles Leclerc, who joined the team this season, is 21.

After the summer break, wins at Spa and Monza saw Leclerc threatening Vettel's status at the team. The younger man's rapid rise coincided with a run of poor Vettel form that saw the media suggesting Sebastian's star was on the wane.

Leclerc continued his hot streak with a scintillating pole at Singapore, where he again led the race; but the team's call on pit stop strategy saw Vettel finish first in a Ferrari 1-2. "What the hell!?" roared Leclerc over team radio when he realised what had happened.

Once tempers cooled, Leclerc followed the team PR line and accepted his fate. Vettel helped him get things in perspective: "You are very misled if you ever think you are bigger than this team," he insisted.

Curiously enough, Seb then seemed to suggest that he was: at Sochi he regally disregarded a team order to let pole-sitter Leclerc past him once the younger man had helped Vettel escape from Hamilton's Mercedes.

In Singapore Vettel said: "The team is bigger than myself, bigger than any individual, and we finished one-two. For me and Charles the order is important. That's why we are here, to fight for victories. But for the team the order is not important." Try telling that to a 21-year-old...

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Or a 23-year-old, like Pierre Gasly.

Red Bull is youth's F1® flagship: the team that gave Vettel four world titles by the time he was 26. It's also a team with a history of tension – the Mark Webber-Vettel pairing was under constant strain in the five years they raced under the same colours.

Now it's Gasly's turn. After two seasons with the junior team, Toro Rosso, Gasly earned promotion to Red Bull – but the young Frenchman played second fiddle to Red Bull's main man, Max Verstappen, who is still only 21.

Two fastest laps were Gasly's only 'trophies' in the first half of 2019 while Verstappen was winning twice and scoring three other podium finishes, and Max outqualified Pierre 11-1. Exit Gasly at the summer break. "It was a shock," Gasly admitted at the time, insisting that he had no idea this thunderbolt was coming until the day it hit him

One door closes... another opens, and the Red Bull entrance opened to allow another bright young man to walk through. F1® rookie Albon, runner-up to Leclerc in GP3 back in 2016, is 23, but he had just 12 Formula 1® races on his CV when Red Bull promoted him. Alex held his own against Toro Rosso team-mate Daniil Kvyat in qualifying and in points scored – but how will he fare against Verstappen, tipped as a World Champion in waiting?

As for Gasly, he is now back where he started at Toro Rosso – but if Albon's move to the senior team works out, where does Pierre go next? It's a personal 'undercut' that might just turn out to be an old-fashioned uppercut to his career.

Behind the 'Big 3' teams, McLaren are best of the rest; their first all-new driver pairing since 2007 is also the youngest on the grid with 25-year-old Carlos Sainz alongside 19-year-old Lando Norris, one of the revelations of the season.

The two young men have forged an apparently close relationship. "Outside of the track, I think there's no point in being selfish, in being that kind of team mate," Sainz says. "At the moment McLaren is going through a period that if you start being selfish, it's just not going to help the team.

"The atmosphere we are living in the team right now, the positivity, the momentum, the motivation we all have... I think Lando and I have realized it's for our own benefit to keep this thing going until hopefully we can make it back to the top. And then we'll see."

Renault for their part have decided to let the vastly-experienced Nico Hülkenberg – over 170 Grand Prix starts since his 2010 debut – go in 2020 and bring in 23-year-old Esteban Ocon, a decision which may have more to do with off-track politics between Mercedes and Renault than any on-track shortcomings.

At Racing Point Lance Stroll is still just 20 while Checo is 29. Alfa Romeo are nurturing 25-year-old Antonio Giovinazzi alongside 40-year-old veteran Kimi Räikkönen,

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and perhaps the most poignant tale of two team-mates in 2019 is the one unfolding at Williams.

George Russell, 21, another Mercedes protégé, has outqualified Robert Kubica, 35, at every race and the fact that Kubica has scored the team's solitary point is down to circumstance rather than performance. So much so that Robert, who so bravely attempted a comeback this year in the aftermath of his catastrophic rallying accident and an eight-year absence from the F1® grid, announced in Singapore that he was calling it quits.

First to sympathise was Russell. "When I first met Robert, I saw that he was a really cool guy and we got along well. But I expected that to change," the young Englishman admitted.

"You know how it is with drivers. We are fighters and I thought our relationship would suffer. But it didn't happen." And Russell, an old head on young shoulders, has his own explanation.

"I think it's because we are at such different stages of our careers. There is no reason for us to make it personal."



UNFINISHED BUSINESSCHECO - AND MEXICO - GO ROUND AGAIN



Dateline Spa-Francorchamps, August 30, 2019: Sergio Pérez is confirmed as a Racing Point F1 driver for the next three seasons.

'There is a lot of unfinished business,' says the 29-year-old Mexican, 'and we haven't got to our maximum yet.'

Grand Prix F1® racing has been Checo's business since 2011, when he joined the Sauber team alongside Japanese driver Kamui Kobayashi. Since then Pérez has finished inside the top 10 of the Drivers' World Championship every year except one.

Ironically enough, that one under-performing season came when he joined the team that throughout his boyhood had been one of the dominant forces in F1[®].

On January 26 1990, Sergio Pérez arrived on the planet when two of F1's greatest stars were at their zenith. It was just three months since Alain Prost secured his third World Championship crown at Suzuka in Japan. In nine more months Ayrton Senna would clinch his own second title at the same venue. Both Prost and Senna were McLaren drivers. One day Checo would be a McLaren driver too.

Between his birth and his arrival on the F1® grid, McLaren boasted not only Senna (Prost joined Ferrari

in 1990) but Mika Häkkinen, David Coulthard, Fernando Alonso and Lewis Hamilton – McLaren's last World Champion to date.

In the two decades Checo spent getting ready to realise his own F1® ambitions, McLaren won 90 Grands Prix, took pole 90 times and set 84 fastest race laps. They claimed three constructors' titles and five drivers' championships.

But by 2013, when Pérez becomes a McLaren driver in his own right, the team that Bruce McLaren created 40 years earlier is in decline. Buoyed by three podiums for Sauber in 2012, the young Mexican makes his McLaren debut in Australia, but team manager Martin Whitmarsh calls it 'one of the most difficult first days to a season I can remember' and those difficulties merely multiply.

Although the team celebrates its 50th anniversary at Monza, 2013 is the first McLaren F1 season without a podium since 1980. Checo amasses 49 points from 10 top-10 finishes out of the season's 19 races but finishes 11th overall, with teammate Jenson Button ninth.

McLaren score 122 points to finish fifth – but champions Red Bull accumulate no fewer than 596. After a single season in which there was often friction between him and Button, Pérez is dropped. Unfinished business...

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A defeated soldier often finds solace in a new army. For Pérez, Force India's will be the flag under which he fights his battles from 2014 onward. There is probably some consolation, too, in the fact that the team will go on to finish higher than McLaren in 2015, 2016 and 2017.

On two occasions – 2016 and 2017 – Checo scores 100 World Championship points or more. But 2017 and 2018 see things turn pear-shaped once more as he and teammate Esteban Ocon are involved in a series of on-track incidents – Baku, Spa, Singapore – which some sections of the media called 'a civil war' at Force India.

Worse still, the team's very existence was threatened as the clouds gathered around its owner, Indian entrepreneur Vijay Mallya. That's when Pérez really rose to the challenge, taking the responsibility of triggering the chain of events that saw the team change identity.

That was one business definitely finished – but there was still unfinished business for its ex-driver. Given the role Pérez played in keeping the team alive, it was no surprise when he was the first to be named as part of its new look and its new future. I want us to be the best of the rest once again, he said. We really want to go to the next level.

That ambition was simply underlined when the new entity announced at round 12 in Belgium that Sergio Pérez would remain a Racing Point driver for a further three years. I believe the best times are still to come, he insisted, referring to the team as his second family. Team principal Otmar Szafnauer called him 'a very complete driver with excellent qualifying speed and exceptional race craft', qualities which may well help Pérez in pursuit of other unfinished business – like a race victory to go with his seven podiums so far.

For Pérez the man as much as Checo the driver, the new deal was also vindication for what had happened in the darker days of 2018. I know that if in three years the result is as big as we expect it to be, he commented, it will be thanks in part to the time I invested in them together with all the other key people.

Checo's new partner-in-crime is Lance Stroll, the young Canadian whose father was also instrumental in bringing Racing Point into being. Asked about Checo's 'history' with teammates, Stroll Junior was philosophical.

As competitive as the sport is, he said, you can still have respect for whoever is on the other side of the garage and whoever does better on track is the one who goes home with the better result. As long as there's respect on the track I'm happy with anyone alongside me

'The most competitive driver is always best, if you ask me, because it always gets the most out of you as a driver. It's always good to have that reference and that someone alongside you who really pushes you to the limit. That's what sport is all about.'

At time of writing Racing Point were seventh in the constructors' standings on 40 points, but with two other midfield teams in Renault and Toro Rosso within striking distance. Contributing 21 of those points, Pérez was 13th – but above him were men on 22, 24, 26 and 31 points, so another top-10 placing overall is still well and truly on the cards for Checo.

As for Mexico, the welcome news that the country will retain its popular Grand Prix through 2022 fits right in with Pérez's own plans. After all, with seventh and eighth his best finishes in four years so far, Checo has unfinished business at AHR as well.

It appears he has also hedged his bets, claiming that his current team wil not stand in his way should the opportunity to join one of the Big Three of modern F1® – Mercedes, Ferrari or Red Bull – come along.

'I am realistic,' he said when his new deal was announced. 'There's no point right now for me to say that I'm going to have a chance with Mercedes or Ferrari for next year. There were years that I was close. It hasn't been for the last years.

I have an opportunity with a team I can grow with. So why not? You see these days that it's difficult for people to find a team where they feel comfortable, not just with the racing side, but the project the team has, that was important for me.

'I'm not saying the opportunity with a top team will not happen anymore as you never know what will happen in Formula 1, but I'm just pleased I have a long-term deal with a team that has a big future ahead.' Unfinished business...

This year we have the immense pleasure of kicking off our 2019-2020 season during the Mexican Grand Prix," said Flavio Abed, CEO of FIA Formula 4 NACAM. 2019 SUPPORT RACESLA CARRERA PANAMERICANA

La Carrera Panamericana is the most important and longest running rally-type motorsports event in the world. It has been compared to a mixture of the Mille Miglia, the Targa Florio of Italy and the Tripoli Grand Prix. During seven intense days, drivers from around the world race together throughout Mexico covering over 3,000 km in adverse conditions.

Originally, the race was created to celebrate the opening of the Pan-American Highway in 1950. During its first five editions, from 1950 to 1954, several drivers from North American and European renowned championships participated in it such as Juan Manuel Fangio, Alberto Ascari, Piero Taruffi, Jean Trevoux, Johnny Mantz, Bill Vukovich and Hershe McGriff, among others. The category raised the interest of European brands in participating such as Ferrari, Porsche, Mercedes Benz, Lancia and Porsche – their participation projected Mexico as an ideal destination capable of organizing top level sporting events.

In 1988 Eduardo Leon gathered and invited different motorsports groups from around the world to join the revival of La Carrera Panamericana. In this new era the goal was to preserve the competition for vehicles manufactured between 1940 and 1965, separated into categories based on the modernization of their engine units, suspensions and safety measures.

Renowned celebrities have participated in this new era including former Formula 1® personalities such as Erik Comas – who has even won it –, Stefan Johansson, Phillipe Alliot, Clay Regazzoni, Jo Ramírez, Guy Edwards, Luigi Villoresi; from WRC Harry Rovanpera and Stig Blomquist have also taken part in it. In addition, over the years outstanding businessmen from around the world have also participated, as well as celebrities such as Pink Floyd stars David Gilmour and Nick Mason who took part in 1989.

With the participation of these guest competitors, the category has positioned itself as one of the world's favorite rally-type competitions.

Every year the route is adapted to the inhospitable terrain of the different landscapes of Mexico. For 2019 La Carrera departed from Oaxaca, continued through Veracruz, Mexico City, Querétaro, Morelia, Guanajuato and Zacatecas, finally finishing in Durango.

The spirit of La Panamericana is about crossing and enjoying Mexico from south to north in seven stages against the clock. About 80 classic cars take on speed stages between one city and another. This represents a great challenge of ability, skill and expertise as the drivers have to overcome the harsh road conditions of drastic curves and narrow roads under extreme weather conditions and at speeds of over 180 km/hour.

La Carrera Panamericana is one of the last major road racing events in the world which, in addition, helps project Mexico to the world as a sports tourism destination. Through its 32 editions, it has welcomed over 1,000 participants from over 20 nationalities, including five former Formula 1® drivers, two former WRC Champions and several other personalities from the business and entertainment industries. At each finish it welcomes more than 200,000 people.

2019 SUPPORT RACESPORSCHE MOBIL 1 SUPERCUP

Exclusivity, internationality and sporting quality – these are the key features of the Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup. The global characteristic of the series has increased in recent years: the driver and team line-ups have an increasingly international look.

The Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup grid is traditionally made up of drivers from all over the world. This year five of the drivers on the grid are reigning champions in national Porsche one-make cups. They are joined by an attractive mix of experienced drivers and youngsters looking to showcase their ability on the big Formula 1® stage. For 2019, the registered competitors come from over 15 countries, with guest drivers supplementing the grid over the season.

The 2019 Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup calendar consists of ten races. The event here in Mexico City will feature the last two races of the season that started in Barcelona back in May. Each race is run over a distance of approximately 70 kilometres, with a fixed number of laps, depending on the track. If the planned distance for the run has not been completed by the leading driver after 30 minutes, the leading driver will receive the chequered flag the next time he passes the control (timing) line.

All competitors drive the latest version of the Porsche 911 GT3 Cup. The four-litre flat six engine develops a peak performance of 357 kW (485 hp). Championship points are awarded on a sliding scale: 20-18-16-14-12-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1.

After celebrating his second championship title last year in the Porsche Mobil 1 Supercup, Michael Ammermüller returns to tackle the season as the defending champion. With only two races left the German driver is at the top of the 2019 driver standings.

The Supercup has featured on the high-class Formula 1® programme since 1993.
