

<u>Tourism</u>

Tavebat Museum

Visit for a fascinating look into Jeddah's cosmopolitan past.



As one of the Gulf's oldest seaports and the gateway to the holy city of Makkah, Jeddah has a long and cosmopolitan past. Tayebat Museum is a superb representation of the city's 2500-year history. Housed in a multiroom complex. The museum has recreated the traditional Hijazi architecture of the old city and offers a living lesson on the foundation of Jeddah and the wider Arabian Peninsula.

<u>King Fahd's Fountain</u>

Visible from all across the city, this much-loved local landmark is located in the middle of the Red Sea. Standing at 312 meters high, the fountain reflects the sunset of Jeddah, giving an impression of close proximity. It is also the world's tallest fountain.



Al Balad

Discover the Kingdom's most evocative historical quarter, which is also listed as UNESCO World Heritage Site.



Built on Jeddah's beautiful coastal land and located 20 minutes from the best shopping experiences, the site gathers people from all cultures. It holds eight gates which challenge different historical factors and holds over 10 ancient houses praised for their distinctive designs and ancient families including Bait Nassif, Bait Matbouli and Bait Nour Wali.

Fakieh Aguarium

This exhibition boasts sprawling tunnels and vast tanks to house over 200 species, with 85% native to Jeddah's undistributed coral reefs. Located on Jeddah's North Corniche, Fakieh Aquarium is Saudi Arabia's first marine exhibition. Its meditative soundtrack and closed cavern walls bring you face-to-face with some of the 800 Red Sea oddities that don't exist anywhere else.

Al Shallal Park

For those needing a combination of sunset and adrenaline, Al Shallal theme park is located in the North Cornish, just a few kilometres from Jeddah. Its roller coasters, high-altitude skating rink, Amazon Rainforest-themed ride, games and restaurants make this one of the best activities in Saudi Arabia.

1.4.2 BEST MUSEUMS IN JEDDAH

Nassif House Museum

Built in 1881 for then-governor of Jeddah, Sheikh Omar Effendi Nassif, the Nassif House Museum is the site of various historical activities, even serving as the temporary royal residence of King Abdulaziz, the founder of the modern Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, in 1925. Located in the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Al Balad, the mansion went from exemplifying Jeddah's elite to becoming a cultural center for all.

Matbouli House Museum

Full of oddities, the Historic District of Jeddah is home to several old houses. As one of Al Balad's more curious spaces, the 400-year-old Al Matbouli House allows you to experience local life at the turn of the century. From how the city's residents dined to the various traditions of hospitality, the place offers a great insight into the values and customs of those who once dwelled in this historic neighbourhood.

Museum of Abdul Raoof Hasan Khalil

Tucked away in a plush neighbourhood that houses modern concrete buildings, the Abdul Raoof Hasan Khalil Museum stands out like a sore thumb, with its exquisite rawasheen (latticed windows), arched galleries, and ornate doors. On the inside, expect Abbasid era coins, rare manuscripts of the Quran, and an assortment of objects d'art.

Al Tayebat City Museum

The museum spans several buildings, all constructed using elements of traditional Hejazi architecture. Today, Al Tayebat City Museum is by far one of the most popular museums in the city, housing a prized collection of pre-Islamic-era pieces. There's also a charming little mosque within the premises, which is a work of art in and of itself. If you fall in love with antiquities after your visit, then you can buy some at one of the many antique shops that line the façade of the museum.

Our Days of Bliss Magad

Situated just a few meters opposite of the far popular Bait Al Naseef, the museum is a window into life in Jeddah during the mid-20th century. This museum beautifully tells the story of that era using quotidian items such as canned food, glass bottles of soft drinks, gramophones, and some of the earliest minted Saudi coins.

Bite into tantalizingly spicy karahi gosht (fried mutton curry) with chana dal (spiced lentils and chickpeas) in this simple, nofrills eatery that serves up some of Jeddah's best curries that don't cost much more than a cup of coffee.

Jeddah's first Brazilian churrascaria is a carnivore's culinary fantasy. South Americans are famous for knowing how to grill their meat, and this elegant restaurant in the InterContinental Hotel offers an all-you-can-eat experience with hard-to-beat views of the Red Sea and King Fahd Fountain, the tallest fountain in the world. Local tip: When seated at Spears, each patron gets a green-and-red wooden cylinder (see above). Leave the green side up if you want waiters to continue to frequent your table with deliciously spiced racks of grilled meat. When your plate starts to fill up, or you need a break to digest, flip the pointer red side up to signal them to stop.

ALCOHOL & SUBSTANCES

The sale, purchase, and consumption of alcohol and drugs is illegal in Saudi Arabia.

CURRENCY

The national currency of Saudi Arabia is the Saudi Riyal (SR) and managed by the Saudi Central Bank. The SAR is made up of 100 halala, and is often presented with the symbol SR. The SAR is currently pegged:

- to the U.S. Dollar at about 3.75 SAR
- to the Euro at about 4.02 SAR
- to the British £ at about 4.51 SAR

One SR is subdivided into 100 halala. You will receive notes in denominations of five riyals, ten riyals, 50 riyals, 100 riyals and 500 riyals; and coins in one riyal, two riyals, 50 halala, 25 halala, 10 halala, 5 halala and 1 halala.

DRESS CODE

The dress code is dependent on individual establishments, some casual, others keen on sophistication. Places of worship specifically do require you to dress modestly while visiting.

ELECTRICITY

Standard electrical power in Saudi Arabia is 230V supply voltage and 60 Hz. The associated plug is type G, which is the plug that has three rectangular pins in a triangular pattern.

GENERAL OPENING HOURS

The normal working hours in Saudi Arabia are from 8am to 5pm with a one-hour lunch break.

BANKS: 9.30am to 4.30pm - 8pm from Sunday to Thursday (at airports, banks are open 24 /7) **Shopping Centres**: 9am-10pm (to midnight Friday and Saturday) **Shops & Souqs**: 8am - noon and 1pm - 9pm to Thursday, from 1pm Friday

GRATUITIES AND TIPPING

In Saudi Arabia tipping is expected to be between 10% and 15% for good service, unless there is a service charge added to the bill. If there is a service charge, there is no need to tip unless the service was exceptional. If your food is being delivered, you should tip between 1 and 3 SAR.

LANGUAGE

Arabic is the official language of Saudi Arabia, but English is widely spoken. It is used in business and is a compulsory second language in schools.



Following last season's revolutionary changes the 10 rule changes for the 2023 season include technical and sporting changes from cutting curfews to grid penalties:

1. Ride height and diffusers adjusted

With some teams encountering porpoising upon the arrival of F1's new-spec cars last year, which feature ground-effect aerodynamics, a set of floor-based flexibility and monitoring measures arrived for the second half of the 2022 season, and more have been outlined for 2023.

In short, four additional changes will come into play this year: floor edges have been raised by 15mm; the diffuser throat height has been raised; the diffuser edge stiffness has been increased; and an additional sensor has been mandated to more effectively monitor the porpoising phenomenon.

These adjustments should, in theory, make significant porpoising a thing of the past and, as such, keep the focus on the thrilling action that F1's rules reset has delivered.

2. Stronger roll hoops after Zhou's crash

Alongside the changes aimed at porpoising, there are tweaks to the safety standards for F1 car roll hoops after the frightening crash experienced by Zhou Guanyu at the start of the 2022 British Grand Prix, which involved his Alfa Romeo sliding along the track upside down.

The 2023 Technical Regulations now state that a rounded top is required on the roll hoop, which will reduce the chance of it digging into the ground during an accident, while they also ensure a minimum height for the point of application of the homologation test.

Additionally, there will be a new physical homologation test where the load pushes the roll hoop in a forward direction.

3. Revised mirrors to improve driver visibility

In an attempt to increase driver visibility, there will be a change to rear-view mirrors on F1's 2023-spec cars, with the width of the reflective surface increasing by 50mm from 150mm to 200mm.

Following tests by Red Bull and Mercedes in Hungary and Belgium respectively last season, the entire grid got involved at the Dutch Grand Prix, and the changes have now been written into the regulations.

4. Double the number of Sprint events

An exciting development for 2023 sees the number of Sprint events doubled from three to six. Azerbaijan (Baku), Austria (Red Bull Ring), Belgium (Spa-Francorchamps), Qatar (Lusail), the United States (Circuit of The Americas) and Sao Paulo (Interlagos) are the venues chosen, following on from extensive research into their suitability

Meanwhile, Sprint accident damage allowance will now be a fixed amount per team, for each race weekend that includes a Sprint session. The forfeit allowance amount for each Sprint will double to \$300k from 2023 onwards, while all other Sprint damage allowances will be removed.

Alongside this, parc ferme rules on Sprint weekends are under review for 2023, with the aim of simplifying the set-up-locking process, after the FIA cited a "significant increase in parc ferme requests" between Friday's qualifying session and Saturday's Sprint.

5. Paddock working hours cut

The number of hours worked by F1 team members across race weekends will be reduced in upcoming seasons, with the third of three restricted periods (effective on Fridays) beginning an hour earlier this year, and another hour set to be knocked off in 2024.

To complement the move, the number of curfews permitted for the first (Wednesday) and second (Thursday) restricted periods will also be cut in half, from eight to four and six to three respectively, again with another cut planned for next year.

6. Qualifying format and DRS trials

A 'Revised Qualifying Format' (RQF) will take place at up to two events in 2023 "for the purpose of evaluating whether the revisions are suitable for subsequent championships" - as per the updated regulations.

This will see tyre compounds mandated for each stage of F1's usual three-part qualifying session: hard tyres only in Q1; mediums tyres only in Q2; and, finally, soft tyres only in Q3. Intermediates and wets will be allowed if the RQF sessions are declared wet.

At RQF events, each driver may use no more than 11 sets of dry-weather tyres, four sets of intermediate tyres and three sets of wet-weather tyres. This compares to the normal weekend allowance of 13 sets of dry-weather tyres, four sets of intermediate tyres and three sets of wet-weather tyres.

As for DRS, its activation after the start, race restart or Safety Car restart will also be evaluated, with the F1 Commission exploring the possibility of bringing this forward by one lap at the start of a race or Sprint or Safety Car restart.

"This will be trialled during each Sprint session in 2023 with a view to introducing it for all races in 2024," the FIA have stated.

7. Tweaks around gearbox changes

While changes to teams' homologated gearboxes were only previously permitted "to resolve reliability problems" or "for cost saving, at the start of each season", modifications are now permitted "in the case of materials, processes or proprietary parts becoming unavailable".

Nonetheless, clear documentation justifying the change must be provided in all cases, prior approval must be obtained from the FIA, and the modification must not give any performance advantage. A summary of the modification will then be circulated to all teams by the FIA.

8. A move to clear up penalty confusion

Grid penalties came under the spotlight at last year's Italian Grand Prix, where a host of drivers took power unit and gearbox related drops and turned the order on its head. Following some confusion over how these were applied, the wording of the regulations has been updated.

The relevant section now reads: "Classified drivers who have accrued more than 15 cumulative grid position penalties, or who have been penalised to start at the back of the grid, will start behind any other classified driver. Their relative position will be determined in accordance with their qualifying classification."

9. More flexibility to cool fuel

A small change on paper could have an impact on reliability in 2023, particularly at hotter races, with some extra freedom being given to teams regarding the cooling of fuel.

For 2023, fuel in a car must not be colder than the lowest of either 10 degrees centigrade below ambient temperature, or 10 degrees centigrade (this being cut from 20 degrees), at any time when the car is running after leaving the competitor's designated garage area.

Bonus points

The driver who records the fastest lap of the race will get one bonus point. However, the driver must also finish in the top 10 in order to qualify for the point. This is to stop all the drivers outside the top 10 pitting for fresh tyres in the last few laps in an effort to set a fastest lap, which would compromise the integrity of the race.

Sprint Events

Formula 1 introduces six F1 Sprint events, with the number of events doubling from three staged in 2021 and 2022.

F1 Sprint sees the standard one-hour qualifying session shifted to Friday, setting the grid for a 100-kilometre dash on Saturday, which in turn sorts the starting order for Sunday's main event.

Next year, the Sprints will be held in Azerbaijan (Baku City Circuit), Austria (Red Bull Ring), Belgium (Spa-Francorchamps), Qatar (Lusail Circuit), the United States (Circuit of The Americas) and Sao Paulo (Interlagos).

Interlagos continues as a Sprint venue after playing host in 2021 and 2022, while the Red Bull Ring also featured the revised format last season. Silverstone, Monza and Imola are the other venues to have hosted Sprints in the past.

The 2023 selection came following research into the most suitable tracks for the format, including overtaking opportunities, close racing and high-speed sections - and is designed to ensure competitive on-track action across all three days of the selected Grand Prix weekends.

F1's financial regulations have also been tweaked, as the sport's governing body the FIA announced the teams' cost cap allowance for each Sprint will double from next year onwards, from \$150,000 to \$300,000 - though there will no longer be any further allowance for accident damage sustained in the Sprint events.

3.5 POINTS & CLASSIFICATION, SPRINT EVENTS *

Formula 1 President and CEO Stefano Domenicali welcomed the increase from three to six events for next year.

"We have seen a hugely positive reaction to the F1 Sprint events during the first two years of its running, and we can't wait to bring even more action to fans with six events next year, including our first US F1 Sprint in Austin," he said.

"The introduction of the F1 Sprint has created a race weekend that includes three days of competitive racing action and brings more entertainment to fans of the sport as well as additional value for key stakeholders including teams, broadcasters, partners, and host venues."

Mohammed Ben Sulayem, President of the FIA added: "Following strong collaboration between the FIA and FOM, and the approval of the World Motor Sport Council, we are pleased to reveal the six events for Sprints for the 2023 season. We look forward to this exciting addition to the calendar."



The Bahrain International Circuit has established itself as a popular host for world-class motor sport since its inception in 2004. Professional facilities and experienced staff have paved the way for numerous international race series to utilize the circuit, including Formula 2/ Formula 3 Championship and Porsche Sprint Challenge Middle East.

One can usually expect great racing and decent amounts of overtaking in Bahrain, while the drivers have to contend with wind, racing under floodlights and the difficulty of finding a decent set-up with the wide temperature fluctuations between sessions. The track's most challenging point is the tight, downhill, off-camber Turn 10 left-hander, while the fast run through Turn 12 is another highlight, allowing the racers to really feel their cars coming alive.



The return of F1 to Jeddah will be third time in less than 16 months that the pinnacle of motorsport will race on the world's fastest and longest street circuit since the inaugural Saudi Arabian Grand Prix took place in 2021. The race joining its Middle Eastern counterparts in Bahrain and Abu Dhabi - while like those races, the Saudi Arabian Grand Prix also takes place under floodlights.


The circuit is fast. Very fast. Average speeds around the Jeddah Corniche Circuit are around 250km/h - quicker than those at Silverstone, and second only to Monza - aka 'The Temple of Speed'. It is, quite simply, the fastest street circuit ever seen in Formula 1 - while the track also features the most corners on the calendar with 27, many of them quick, sinuous bends as the drivers wend their way along the Jeddah waterfront.




As a temporary facility, Albert Park can be quite bumpy - though resurfacing for 2022 will have improved matters - while the circuit at the start of the weekend is often slippery, rubbering in as the sessions progress. It's also a circuit that requires a well-sorted chassis, with several spots on the track where the drivers require a reactive front end to allow them to chuck it into a corner - the main one being the rapid Turn 11-12 chicane. Melbourne is also one of the faster tracks on the calendar, with Lewis Hamilton's 2019 pole lap set at an average of over 235km/h.


The six kilometre, anti-clockwise layout of the circuit offers a mixture of wide and open straights as well as tight and twisty corners. The circuit starts with a very long main straight along the Baku shoreline, then loop around Government House before heading west to Maiden Tower. Here, the track has a narrow uphill traversal and then circle the Old Town, wending past Baku's medieval city walls before opening up onto a 2.2 km (1.4 mi) stretch along Neftchilar Avenue back to the start line.




The circuit offers a thrill ride. After testing his AlphaTauri ATO1 at the track in the build-up to the 2020 season, Pierre Gasly called the experience one of the best he'd ever had in a Formula 1 car, while his then-team mate Daniil Kvyat remarked that "an F1 car through corners like Acque Minerali - the entrance is so fast, it's so cool. It really gives you a lot of adrenaline." The anti-clockwise circuit is certainly fast, with an old-school feel as the drivers put it on the line in iconic corners like the aforementioned Acque Minerali and Piratella.



Today, the circuit is a familiar site for teams and drivers as the track is used for extensive offseason testing. The circuit underwent resurfacing and track modifications over last year's winter and is a good mix of high- and low-speed corners, with the challenging Turn 3 right-hander a great chance to evaluate the balance of the car.


The track offers plenty of choice for spectators with almost the whole track overlooked by grandstands or general admission areas. On the outside of Turn 1, Grandstand A will let you see the best overtaking spot on the track, while the general admission area around Turn 3 will provide the awe-inspiring sight of Formula 1 cars being pushed to the limit of their downforce capabilities.





But then as the drivers work their way downhill, the circuit becomes a regular toboggan ride, as the cars canyon through a series of quick corners, including the exhilarating Rindt right-hander, named for Austria's first F1 champion.

It's hard to stop the goose bumps from prickling as you walk around one of the great cathedrals of motorsport, while in terms of atmosphere, the British fans are always reliably raucous.


At the 2018 British Grand Prix, Lewis Hamilton compared a flat-out lap around Silverstone to flying a fighter jet, which should tell you all you need to know about the Northamptonshire circuit. Despite numerous layout changes over the years, Silverstone has always maintained its essential character as one of the fastest tracks on the F1 calendar, while historic corners like Maggotts, Becketts and Abbey provide some of the biggest challenges for racing drivers anywhere in the world.


The lack of straights at the Hungaroring often sees it compared to a karting circuit - and it's true, the resemblance is uncanny. With several series of corners to string together, teams opt for Monaco levels of downforce, with a well-sorted chassis tending to be rewarded over horsepower given the short straights on offer. It's a challenge many of the drivers' relish, however, with finding a good rhythm key to setting fast lap times.


Spa is among Formula 1 drivers' most loved tracks, with its mix of long straights and challenging fast corners allowing them to push their cars to the edge of their capabilities - if it's dry, that is. The size of the track and the nature of Belgian weather means it can sometimes be raining on one part of the track and dry on another, meaning grip can vary from one corner to the next. Keep an eye on the thrilling Eau Rouge, arguably the most famous sequence of corners in the world, as the drivers flick left, right, and then up the hill through Raidillon.

Originally made up of a mixture of permanent track and public roads that snaked through the sand dunes of the Zandvoort resort town, the Dutch Automobile Racing Club - who initiated the plans for the circuit - brought in 1927 Le Mans winner Sammy Davis to consult on the layout for the original 4.2km track. After a break since 1985, Formula 1 returned to Zandvoort in 2021.


The current F1 drivers describe the track 'really quick', 'pretty insane', 'crazy' and 'old-school' that many of them tackled in their junior category days. We'd also add 'undulating' to that list. The Zandvoort track swoops and flows through the sand dunes, creating a rollercoaster-like feel to the lap.

It was then part of the original Formula 1 calendar in 1950 and has held the Italian Grand Prix every year bar one since.


Formula 1's fastest ever lap was set at Monza - William's driver Juan Pablo Montoya's 260.6km/h effort during practice for the 2004 Grand Prix - which should give you some idea of the nature of the track the locals call 'La Pista Magica'. Cars are on full throttle for 80% of the lap and hit their Vmax on the circuit's 1.1km start/finish straight. From there, they roar off into the historic park section, where a series of big stops into tight chicanes give the brakes a good workout.



The circuit also boasts some of the most unique features of any track on the F1 calendar, including Turn 18, which actually sees the drivers pass underneath a grandstand.



Among the most popular are the high-speed 130R and the famous Spoon Curve. Its "figure-of-eight" layout also makes the track unique in F1 racing, where the back straight passes over the front via an overpass.


The circuit was built within just over a year in preparation for hosting Qatar's first ever MotoGP event in 2004. In 2021 Qatar hosted Formula 1 for the very first time and signed an additional 10-year deal to host the sport from 2023.

The track is fast and flowing where medium- and high-speed corners predominate. Over one kilometre of the track's total length is made up of the main straight, which provides plenty of overtaking opportunities into Turn 1.

The Circuit of The Americas, designed by Hermann Tilke in collaboration with American architectural firm HKS, endured something of a nervy start, with construction suffering several setbacks. It was well worth the wait, though, when 1978 F1 champion Mario Andretti opened the track on October 21 2012.


If the corners at COTA seem familiar, they should be. Turns 3 through 6 look not dissimilar to Silverstone's high-speed run through Maggotts/Becketts or the S Curves at Suzuka, while Turns 12 through 15 mimic Hockenheim's stadium section. Meanwhile, the uphill run into wide, wide Turn 1 - hey, everything's bigger in Texas, right? - has provided some fine overtaking action in the track's short life.

In 1959, the father of Mexico's most famous racing brothers, Ricardo and Pedro Rodriguez, was an advisor to Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateo, and had a word in his boss's ear about building a racing circuit in Mexico City's Magdalena Mixiuhca sports park using the existing internal roads. El Presidente liked the idea, and work on the track was completed in under a year.

The racetrack is located over 2,200m above sea level, which makes it the highest altitude venue on the F1 calendar. The thin air at this altitude presents a unique challenge for cars and drivers.


To put it in perspective, Brazil's Interlagos, the second-highest race location, is at around 800m above sea level.

Building work began on what ended up being called the Autodromo Jose Carlos Pace - but what is more commonly referred to as Interlagos - all the way back in 1938. The track designers took their inspiration from three main circuits: Brooklands in the UK, Roosevelt Raceway in the USA and Montlhery in France.


Buoyed by the success of Brazil's Emerson Fittipaldi, Formula 1 first jetted into Interlagos for a World Championship race in 1973. Fans were treated to a home win in the first three Brazilian Grands Prix, with Fittipaldi victorious in 1973 and 1974, while Carlos Pace won in 1975.


Las Vegas hosted two Formula 1 race in 1981 and 1982 on a temporary track next to the Caesars Palace hotel. This years' return to Formula 1 will take place in the heart of downtown Las Vegas - the new 6.12km, 14-turn street circuit winds its way past iconic locations like the aforementioned Caesars Palace, the Bellagio and the Venetian. With average speeds expected to match Monza, otherwise known as F1's "Temple of Speed", there promises to be plenty of action and overtaking.

The Hermann Tilke-designed track, inaugurated in 2009 and located on Yas Island is Formula One's first ever day-night race, starting in the afternoon and finishing after sunset. Floodlights are activated from the start of the race to provide a transition into the evening.

The circuit is dominated by its 1.2km straight between Turns 7 and 8 - which, with slow-speed corners marking its beginning and end, makes it a honeypot for overtaking moves. Other highlights include the tricky run through Turns 15 and 16 into 17, which forces the drivers to brake hard with bags of lateral load still on the car.

INTRODUCTION

2023 marks the seventh year of the Formula 2 Championship™. It has proved to be the chief feeder series to Formula 1, having produced ready-made talent for F1 with Charles Leclerc, George Russell, Lando Norris, Alexander Albon, Yuki Tsunoda, Guanyu Zhou, Nyck De Vries, Oscar Piastri and Logan Sargent all having made the step up.

Racing on F1 weekends, the series provides the drivers with the opportunity to showcase their talents in front of F1 teams, competing on some of the most challenging and renowned circuits in the world.

It is a one-make championship consisting of 22 identical cars. The chassis are designed by Dallara Automobili, and since 2018 has run the F2 2018 chassis. The power base is a Mecachrome-assembled 3.4L turbocharged V6.

Being the ultimate breeding ground for young racing talent, the series requires a very specific set of regulations, which balance out the competitiveness of the Championship, the financial restrictions of teams and drivers as well as the wow factor for the audience, when they follow the action. There are five core values at the heart of the FIA Formula 2 Championship to guarantee proposed changes and modifications fit in with these five values:

Performance - F2 is the only junior Formula in the world which can get close to the performance levels of Formula 1. The lap times are competitive with the final few rows on the F1 grid thanks to our turbocharged engines, which produce 620bhp. The switch to 18-inch tyres a year ahead of F1 will also ensure the competitiveness of the Championship in the future.

Cost Control - The series aims to produce drivers who are readymade for F1. To achieve this the fastest and most competitive young racers on the planet are required, regardless of any financial restrictions they may have. This makes cost effectiveness key. Operating at around 2% of the cost of running an F1 team, the series always tries to reach the perfect blend of budget control and performance.

This has been achieved by centralised purchasing, strict limits on team personal and testing and an outright ban on individual developments costs. Any modifications made are produced with an eye on how they will affect the price structure for the teams.

Entertainment - F2 is the most exciting and competitive single-make championship in the world. Racing on the same tracks and the same weekends as F1, the Championship never fails to enthral and entertain, with three races per weekend, reverse grids, compulsory pitstops, Prime and Option tyres and 22 identical cars on display.

Safety - Racing at speeds very close to F1, safety is of paramount importance to F2. The car has been designed to strict F1 safety standards and submitted to stringent FIA crash tests. The cars include the Titanium Halo head protection system used in F1 and anti-intrusion panels, while wearing the HANS device is compulsory for drivers. The championship puts its commitment to safety ahead of all other considerations.

Preparation - In the history of F1, no feeder category had been as successful as the GP2 series, which meant that F2 had big shoes to fill. However, it also means that we are experts in our field and in the four seasons of the Championship so far, no fewer than eight drivers have made the step up to the top tier of motorsport.

Alongside the FIA, who have run the Formula 1 Championship for its entire history, we know how to prepare drivers for the rigours and demands of F1. In 2019, half of the grid was made up of graduates from either GP2 or F2, including seven-time F1 World Champion Lewis Hamilton. There is no finer testament to the benefit of the training we provide to young drivers than that.

REGULATIONS

Tyre allocation - The sporting regulations state that each driver will be allocated five sets of dry-weather tyres per weekend. They will have three "prime" specification sets and two of the "option" specification. Each driver will also be provided with three sets of wet-weather tyres.

DRS - The drivers are able to use the Drag Reduction System (DRS) as they wish within the designated DRS zones during free practice and qualifying. During both races however, the drivers will only be allowed to activate DRS within the designated zones when they are within less than a second of the car in front at the detection point.

During the race, the DRS is available for use after two laps unless decided otherwise by the race director due to poor weather conditions or yellow flags in the designated DRS zones.

The DRS zones will be the same as the ones used in Formula One on every circuit of the calendar.

The same safety rules apply: the DRS is disabled at the end of the designated zones, and the first time the driver uses the brakes after activation. No individual developments or upgrades are permitted in the series, and all spare parts must be purchased directly from the F2 championship organisers. Repairs of structural components must be carried out by Dallara in order to ensure integrity.

WEEKEND FORMAT & POINTS ALLOCATION

The Friday sessions are composed of one free 45 minutes practice session and 30 minutes qualifying session.

One sprint races will take place on Saturday and will both consist of 120 kilometres or 45 minutes, whichever comes first.

The Feature Race now takes place on Sunday morning ahead of the Formula 1 Grand Prix. It will still be 60 minutes or 170 kilometres (whichever comes first). The race includes a compulsory pitstop, in which all four tyres must be changed. Unless the driver has used wet-weather tyres during the Feature Race, they must use at least one set of each specification of dry-weather tyres during the Feature Race.

Starting grids - With two races and only one Qualifying session taking place per event, the results of the Friday's final classification of the Qualifying session will determine the starting grid for the Sunday Feature Race.

WEEKEND FORMAT & POINTS ALLOCATIONS

The results of the final classification of Friday's Qualifying session will determine the starting grid for Sunday's Feature Race.

The starting grid of Saturday's Sprint Race will be determined by reversing the top 10 finishers of Friday's Qualifying session results.

Points attribution - The driver who takes pole position following the final classification of Friday's Qualifying session will be awarded with two points.

For the Sprint Race, the top eight classified drivers will be awarded 10, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 points respectively. For the Feature Race, the top 10 finishers will score 25, 18, 15, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 2 and 1 points respectively.

In each race, one point will be awarded to the driver who achieves the fastest lap time, providing he was in the top 10 positions of the final race classification. No points will be awarded if the fastest lap time is achieved by a driver who was classified outside the top ten positions.
